Online Book from a Database:

Article in an Encyclopedia or Reference Book:

Websites

Include as much of the following information as possible: Author/Corporate author; *Title of Site*; Sponsor of Site; date or last update; medium; date of access. If there is no copyright, revision or other publication date given, use n.d.

The *MLA Handbook* suggests that you include a URL ONLY if the reader might not be able to locate the website without it or if your instructor requires it. If included, the URL should be enclosed in < > and added as the last element of a citation.
